

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Introduction

Building a Thriving Tulsa Together: Sustainable Growth, Inclusive Community, and Economic Impact



Tulsa Remote has always been about more than just bringing new faces to town—it's about creating an environment where both remote workers and longtime residents can connect and thrive. By fostering organic connections and shared experiences, the program contributes to the social fabric that makes Tulsa an appealing place to call home. The goal is to support a collaborative community—one where new opportunities emerge, local businesses benefit, and a spirit of inclusivity continues to grow.

In 2024, the focus remained on ensuring that the program's positive impact is deeply rooted in both the success of Remoters and the vitality of the local Tulsa community. Even as return-to-office culture has lost momentum nationwide, Tulsa Remote continued to steadily welcome new members, reinforcing long-term, sustainable progress. The numbers speak for themselves — members are contributing to economic growth, supporting local businesses, and helping position Tulsa as a city engaged in emerging industries.

A Remoter is any participant, active member or alumni, of the Tulsa Remote program.

Ecomomic Impact



Job Growth: More Opportunity for All

With every new Remoter who arrived in 2024, the city gained more than just another talented professional—it gained economic momentum. The program sustained an estimated **304 jobs** and added **\$18 million in labor income** to Tulsa's local economy in 2024 alone. But the impact doesn't stop there. Thanks to our growing community of remote workers who have chosen to stay, an estimated **1,468** jobs and **\$88 million in new and induced income** has been added to the local economy.^{3,4} With an impressive **12X return on our relocation investment**, Tulsa Remote is proving to be a powerhouse of sustainable economic development.

Timothy Bartik, Senior Economist at the W.E. Upjohn Institute for Employment Research, collaborated with Tulsa Remote to analyze the program's effectiveness in encouraging migration to Tulsa. His research revealed that the vast majority of participants relocated to Tulsa specifically because of the program. As a result, Bartik concluded that talent attraction initiatives like Tulsa Remote are effective policies for promoting economic growth:

Unlike business attraction programs, which often involve large financial incentives and infrastructure investments, talent attraction programs like Tulsa Remote bring new income and economic activity into the community with relatively lower costs. State and local policymakers should be willing to broaden their economic development policies to consider alternative policies, which may be more cost-effective. Based on this report, this broadening to alternative policies should include well-run remote worker attraction programs, as exemplified by Tulsa Remote."

Boosting Tulsa's Tax Revenue

The benefits of Tulsa Remote extend far beyond individual paychecks. The jobs created and sustained by our members have contributed an estimated **\$30.5 million** in county and state taxes—funding essential public services, schools, and infrastructure. Breaking it down further, **\$18 million** has gone to state taxes, while **\$12.5 million** has strengthened Tulsa County's tax base. The ongoing annual tax contributions from Tulsa Remote members' job creation is projected at **\$5.6 million for Tulsa County** and **\$8.0 million for the State of Oklahoma**—a lasting return that benefits everyone who calls Tulsa home.³

A Growing Tech Hub: Building Tulsa's Future Together

Tulsa is on the rise as a national leader in technology and innovation. In 2024, the **U.S. Economic Development Administration (EDA) awarded \$51 million** to the Tulsa's Tech Hub, cementing the city's role in the advancement of autonomous systems, cybersecurity, and defense technologies. This growing industry offers vast potential, and Tulsa Remote is playing a key role in ensuring local talent is ready to step in.

Right now, Tulsa's concentration of software developers, computer engineers, and other tech professionals is **60% lower than the national average**, creating a major opportunity for growth.⁵ Tulsa Remote is helping bridge that gap—**26% of our 2024 members work in software development, general engineering, computer engineering, or IT fields**, directly contributing to the city's future as a tech and innovation hub. By bringing in skilled professionals, we're not just helping fill a gap—we're building an ecosystem where both new and existing Tulsans can thrive in high-demand, high-paying industries.




